SAFE CARE PROGRAM: CPC Jeff Cty selected as one of 15 national Substance-Exposed Infant Initiative demonstration sites selected for federal funding of \$210,000. The purpose of the SAFE CARE Program is to address the emerging substance use crisis and its impact on infants and children, ensure plans of safe care are implemented for both prenatally exposed infants and their mothers with SUD. Services include care

coordination for recovery, mental health, medical, early intervention, parenting and in-home education. National recognition received for this CPC SAFE CARE program and used as a model for others around the country and within Alabama.

SAFE CARE Program is designed to help build and retain intact families affected by substance use disorders, to ensure effective safety plans are in place for substance-affected infants and that community resources are utilized to meet the needs of their mothers and families.

This program helps mothers create plans of safe care for themselves and their infants. Each participant has a Care Coordinator providing integrated intensive case management including assisting with navigation of CPS, Family Court as well as substance abuse treatment, recovery support, parenting education, mental health services, housing, therapeutic visitation, maternal and child health, and in-home education. Participation in SAFE CARE can begin prenatally and continue from birth to 3 years of age.

Program success measures:

- · Permanency and Reunification
- No DHR or Court Involvement
- Collaboration of Community Partners
- Increase capacity of mother to live sober and meet the needs of the child
- · Bonding and social-emotional wellbeing

TARGET POPULATION The SAFE CARE Program is for pregnant and postpartum mothers with substance use disorders, using legal or illicit substances, and those receiving Medication Assisted Treatment. Those eligible for the program are pregnant mothers as well as those with substance-exposed infants from birth to 3 years old.

SAFE CARE SERVED: 76 SUBSTANCE-INVOLVED WOMEN and 115 CHILDREN. 81% of 115 affected children birth to 2 years old were able to remain in home or relative placement. 62% of all safe care participants have no open case with CPS as of June 2020.

Family Reunification Program: The CPC Family Reunification Program offers Therapeutic Supervised Visitation Coaching and safe exchange services to build the capacity of parents and children to maintain their familial bond, reduce the trauma of separation, increase the likelihood of successful reunification and safety. Non-custodial parents and their children are provided Visit Coaching in a safe and comfortable setting at

YMCA Youth Center and other locales. FRP helps resolve issues that created the need for out of home care and reduce trauma associated with out of home placement. Referrals from DHR, Family Court, family law attorneys, social service providers. Safe exchange facilitation in cases of DV and PFA enable parents to build and maintain relationships with their children while maintaining personal safety and boundaries.

How the need for this program changed due to COVID-19.

The need for the FRP program has been magnified due to COVID-19. For the short term starting in March 2020 the visits transitioned to virtual supervised visitations via ZOOM, set up and monitored by a therapeutic visitation coach. During this time the YMCA Youth Center was not available nor were in-person visitations deemed safe. We are now transitioning back gradually on a family by family basis to in-person visitations, utilizing established protocols and safety measures in compliance with CPC guidelines. Some families remain as virtual supervised visits due to risk factors related to COVID

Accomplishment 3

Child Trafficking Solutions Project: The Child Trafficking Solutions Project, founded and coordinated by the CPC at the request of Family Court Presiding Judge Chambliss in 2016, is a broad-based coalition of law-enforcement, juvenile justice, health/mental health, child welfare agencies and NGO's working collaboratively to recognize and respond to exploitation and trafficking of children through uniform response protocols, training, and strategic partnerships while mobilizing communities to prevent abuse, raise awareness and increase safety. Components of this initiative include the VOICES Trafficking Docket at Family Court; a comprehensive training program and uniform response protocol for law enforcement, child welfare, Family Court, and first-responders; successful passage through the leveraging of CTSP allies and advocates of Human Trafficking bills and ordinances, engaging communities to commit to becoming Trafficking Free Zones.

Trafficking Free Zone Commitments This Year

Ten cities and neighborhoods within Jefferson County signed Proclamations declaring their cities as Trafficking Free Zones: Vestavia Hills, Mountain Brook, Homewood, Hoover, Birmingham, Trussville, Center Point, Woodlawn. Additionally, the cities of Cullman, Alexander City and Opelika did so as well through the work of the CTSP. The World Games 2021 (now 2022) committed to partnership with CTSP Coalition to train all of its volunteers, event staff, as well as present prevention and awareness information to attendees, athletes, visitors and hospitality partners. Included is the commitment by these cities to train 100% of city employees in trafficking awareness and prevention. This represents over 6,000 employees within Jefferson County with training underway, coordinated through the CTSP Coalition. Despite COVID, this employee training has moved forward thanks to on-line training modules.

Training Statistics

Over 3,000 individuals were trained through the CTSP this year: law enforcement (Jefferson County Sheriff Department, Birmingham Police Academy recruits quarterly, multiple local municipalities), DHR staff, educators (for example 100% of all Homewood City School staff), CASA volunteers (75 statewide), JPO and Juvenile justice staff, Health and Mental Health (UAB, Brookwood, Eastside MH, Jefferson County Health Department, Children's of AL), Faith Community (example: 34 pastors through Birmingham Office of Faith-Based Initiatives), child-serving professionals, attorneys. Summary of targeted training groups:

- Law Enforcement, First Responders
- Restaurants, Hospitality Industry, Hotels, Transportation Providers
- Health and Mental Health Providers
- Schools (educators, parents, students using age appropriate materials)
- Faith-Based, Civic Organizations and General Public
- City employees associated with a Trafficking Free Zone municipality

MDT Coordinating Council Established:

The CTSP Coalition was organized this year into five MDT's (Multi-Disciplinary Teams) with a Coordinating Council: Law Enforcement, Survivor Care, Community Engagement, Public Policy, Training. These MDT's are focused upon these Common-Goal Initiatives:

- Arm front-line industries and sectors with training to combat human trafficking
- Increase comprehensive public awareness/human trafficking education, specifically within median age range group, high-risk groups and in schools
 - Create and implement uniform survivor care procedures with trauma-centered approach
 - Cross-jurisdictional interdisciplinary team approach re: investigation and management of CSEC cases
- Analyze systematic barriers to child trafficking prevention, prosecution, survivor care and advocate for policies/solutions

Multiple federal grants were pursued this year to support the work of the CTSP with decisions waiting to be heard prior to the end of the fiscal year Sept 30 2020.

Welcome / Call to Order/Board Chair Report: Catherine Alexander-Wright called the meeting to order and established that a quorum was present. Ms. Ramsey has been working with the Executive Director as well as Executive Committee related to HR policy review and recommendations for the CPC. She was asked by the Executive Committee to provide an in-service training to the CPC Board of Directors related to differentiated roles of Executive Director, Board Members and Shared Responsibilities. She provided materials and moderated discussion around Board and ED and staff roles within a non-profit organization.

Report from Family Court: Vanessa Jones, Deputy Court Administrator, provided an update re: activities at Family Court. She spoke about upcoming Jefferson County budget hearings as pertained to Family Court as well as about upcoming Community Resource Fairs being hosted by Family Court in Bessemer and this location, inviting CPC Board members to spread the word within their agencies and networks.

Governance Committee Update: Katrina Watson, Governance Chair, shared with the Board several drafted policies for review and adoption. An updated Whistleblower Protection Policy was presented followed by a motion by John Stone, seconded by Joan Wright to adopt as presented. There being no further discussion, the policy was adopted unanimously (see attached). An updated CPC Human Resource Handbook drafted by the Executive Director with input from multiple Board members as well as Rena Ramsey was presented for discussion and adoption. Polly McClure moved to adopt the Handbook with the caveat that it be reviewed to ensure that inclusive language is used consistently throughout as well as that it was clearly identified in headings which sections applied

to employees, to vendors (1099) service providers and to volunteers in some cases. Elaine Stephens seconded the motion as presented and the Board as a whole approved this motion unanimously through voice vote.

Katrina went over Executive Session guidelines and distributed an informational handout related to the why, who, what and how of Executive Sessions. Rena Ramsey provided additional insights for the Board related to the use of Executive Sessions by non-profit boards.

Katrina reminded the Board of the 100% Board Giving goal in 2019 at the level of their choice. She referenced an average of \$100 has been the norm in past years as a benchmark for consideration.

Advocacy Committee: Joan Wright provided an update from the Advocacy Committee. She reported on the successful outcomes of the 2019 legislative season as related to the CPC Policy Agenda, including the \$26 million First Class Pre-K success in funding. She mentioned that an August 1st celebration of the opening of a new First Class Pre-K at Trinity Love Center in Bessemer was planned to which legislators were being invited and would be thanked. She encouraged CPC Board members to write letters of thank you to their own Jefferson County legislators who had supported legislation on the CPC advocacy priority platform during the non-legislative season.

Update on CPC Initiatives: Jan Bell handed out updates related to the SAFE CARE Program as well as Family Reunification Program with brief remarks given the time constraints of the Board meeting agenda.

There being no business or items identified that required the need to go into Executive Session, the meeting was adjourned at 10:00 am.

All YMCAs including the youth center have been closed. While FRP is not generating income, there are also no expenses. Jan is planning to reach out to FRP families to identify whether they are in need of resources.

Advocacy Action Items: Angelica Melendez, Advocacy Chair, invited members to share about emerging issues and actions tied to the COVID-19 crisis. Angelica informed the board regarding AL Power not charging late fees nor disconnecting power due to the crisis. Joan Wright expressed the need to reach out to Federal and State legislators to encourage that the stimulus bill include relief for childcare providers, childcare workers, and families needing child care. Joan Wright moved the CPC, as an advocacy body, prepare a letter for US congressional elected officials to consider a stimulus bill for childcare needs. The motion was seconded by Elaine Stephens and unanimously approved. Angelica

Melendez, Advocacy Chair, requested updates on the status of CPC advocacy platform issues. Morissa Ladinsky reported that SB303 passed the senate with an amendment that takes out educators. Approval of Minutes March 20, 2020 Board Meeting: Greg Townsend, Board Chair, presented the minutes from the March 20, 2020 meeting that were compiled by Secretary Melissa Niven. Joan Wright moved that they be accepted as presented, seconded by Natasha Shumpert, and followed by a unanimous approval. Minutes for the Executive Committee meetings of April 3, 2020 and May 14, 2020 were also included in the board packet for review prior to the board meeting.

Finance: Elaine Stephens, Treasurer, presented the financial report including the financial statements as of April 30, 2020. She remarked that financials remain in a strong position at this time. Elaine Stephens moved to accept the financial report, seconded by Julie Pearce, and followed by a unanimous vote of approval.

Treasurer Elaine Stephens reviewed the Executive Committee decision to engage Kassouf & Co. for an audit of the 2019 financials. An audited financial statement is needed to meet the criteria for applying for various grants. CPC was awarded \$10,000 in Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) funds which will function as a grant and not require repayment. Also awarded was \$12,700 in Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loans from the Small Business Administration. Funds are held in a separate account and we are actively reviewing guidance regarding the funds as the government releases information. Joan Wright confirmed the Senate passed a PPP reform bill on June 3, 2020, adjusting the time frame for expending funds and revising the allocation of funds.

CPC Operational Update: Jan Bell, Executive Director, provided an operational update. Family Reunification Program (FRP) has conducted no in-person visits since March 8, 2020. There was a delay of eight weeks by DHR to approve reimbursement for virtual visits. DHR has authorized billing at the same rate for virtual visits which began three weeks ago (mid-May). FRP is using Zoom with added security features and training coaches in the new format. Devella Malone is Interim FRP Coordinator to assist in meeting with all families regarding new guidelines. Setup calls and debriefing with the custodian

provides opportunity for relationship building with custodial parents. Shajuane Jones is participating inperson and via Zoom for court hearings.

Shajuane Jones, Safe Care Director, provided an update including successes with enrollment, women connected to treatment, births to enrolled women, and families regaining custody. Background information for a Safe Care press piece was provided to an AL.com reporter who is currently furloughed. Recent support for grant applications show significant statewide support. A Federal grant was submitted with the Alabama Department of Mental Health as fiscal agent to provide potential sustainability.

Jan Bell provided an update on the Child Trafficking Solutions Project. Statistically, and anecdotally, child trafficking has increased. CTSP has experienced success with online trainings including Mountain Brook training 100% of employees and Birmingham offering online training for pastors through Mayor's Office of Peace and Policy. Children's Aid Society hosted CTSP training for 397 participants and has agreed to host future CTSP online trainings on their platform for all target audiences (medical, legal, educators, law enforcement, and general).

First Friday Forums were conducted virtually in April (Mental Health), May (Domestic Violence) and will occur this Friday for June (Child Trafficking). The FBI investigation to the May Zoom bomb of FFF is ongoing. Jan and Shajuane continue the delivery of diapers during the COVID crisis.

CPC Board Member Check-ins: Greg Townsend, Board Chair, conducted a brief discussion of the agency needs and services available through CPC board members. The following board members gave updates: Joan Wright, Katrina Watson, Melissa Niven, George Casey, and Julie Pearce.

Vanessa Jones, Deputy Court Administrator noted that Family Court anticipates returning to a full docket on June 15, 2020. Social distancing will be required in the waiting areas.

Adjournment - There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:46 a.m.
